Thank you to all the parents and guardians of our preschool students who came in for our parent teacher conferences on behalf of Mrs. Conway and Mrs. Rarey. It was a pleasure talking with all of you.

The preschool classes of Mrs. Conway and Mrs. Edson had a wonderful November month learning about food groups and good nutrition. We discussed the 4 basic food groups; meals of the day; where foods come from; how they get to the stores and how to prepare meals.

In December, the children are learning about the various holidays celebrated: Hanukkah; Ramadan, Christmas,

Kwanzaa and New Years! We learned about these holidays by viewing and discussing posters, singing songs and story books read to them. They will bring home a booklet entitled "My Holiday Alphabet Book," as well as lyrics to famous holiday songs.

The preschool classes of Mrs. Rarey and Mrs. Rodriguez have been busy trying to help people in need. The parents generously donated muffin mix and fruit and the children spent the week baking muffins for the soup kitchen. We mixed and measured and counted. After all the muffins were done, we put them into hand-decorated bags along with a piece of fruit and a juice box. We made over 100 bags! Mrs. Valentin and Koralise (who was in preschool 3 years ago, but still does this every year!) delivered the bags to the soup kitchen where 2 students from the morning class, Jenna Pavelkops and Daren Johnson (along with their moms) handed them out to the happy customers.

We have also been reading about Alex's Lemonade Stand and collecting money so that we can have a yummy snack and an icy cold glass of lemonade while at the same time helping children who are sick. We have already gotten over \$150!

The last project we will do will be to do chores at home to raise money for Heifer International. This organization gives animals to people who then learn to take care of them and make money from them as well as pass on the baby animals to their neighbors so that they too can make

Third grade students have begun the **Friends to Grow On** theme in their anthology. They have read The Stories Julian Tells by Ann Cameron, The main character Julian is in need of a good friend and he finds one when Gloria moves in next door. In The Talent Show, by Susan Wojciechowski, a girl named Beanie realizes she has a special talent to share in the school talent show. The students have also read Centerfield Ballhawk by Matt Christopher. This realistic fiction is about a boy named Jose who wants his dad to be proud of him. Ask your child what a ballhawk is. They may be able to teach you something you did not know before.

The students have completed a focus on *nonfiction texts*. They read factual books and learned information from them. Students can describe the elements of nonfiction books such as the table of content, index and glossary. They easily notice bold print words and captions describing photographs. The students can explain diagrams, maps and charts found in many nonfiction books. They are truly becoming active, engaged readers and it is exciting to see the growth!

The new focus in reading comprehension is making connections. Third graders are making self to text, text to text and world to text connections. Every connection must include a feeling. In mathematics the students have begun a unit on *multiplication* and have learned how to create **arrays** (an arrangement of object in equal rows and columns) to solve multiplication facts. They are very excited about learning the times tables. This year students are responsible for learning the 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 10 facts. They have learned the names for the numbers being multiplied (**factors**) and that the answer is called a **product**. Please help your child learn these facts. Knowing them will greatly help in other areas of math and will also help students to solve real world problems in life.

Did you notice the dictionaries your child came home with? They were donated to Roger Sherman third grade students by the *Rotary Club*. A great big, "Thank You!" to the Rotarians! The

students have enjoyed using them, not only to look up the meaning or spelling of words, but also reading them. Yes, Reading them! The dictionaries are loaded with interesting facts, charts and maps!

The fifth grade classes of Miss Abbott, Mrs. Owen and Mrs. Tellez, worked together to "build" on our knowledge of geometry. The students were split into mixed, cooperative groups. Each group was given a box of spaghetti and a bag of mini marshmallows. As a group, they had to work together to create a structure. Each team needed to problem solve to create structures to fit the following criteria: Most Aesthetically Pleasing Structure, Tallest Free-Standing Structure, and Structure That Can Hold the Most Weight. Each team spent time discussing possible creations to fit those categories. As building began, many teams became frustrated and looked for outside assistance with their structures. The students were reminded that a successful structure must start with a strong base. Although the students viewed this activity as being very simple, they quickly discovered it would take a lot of teamwork to create a structure at all. In the end, each team was able to create a structure of some kind. The winning structure held over 2 pounds of weight! All of the students enjoyed being a part of the activity!

Most Kindergarteners have mastered how to log onto the computer, and how to use a mouse and keypad. They are also typing their first and last names using upper and lower case letters, and are inserting clip art and WordArt. First graders are creating their own PowerPoint show. They are creating new slides, copying and pasting images, adding color, creating transitions and animations and importing sound. They are having so much fun when they run their slide shows and see all the things that they added to it! Second graders have transitioned into the adult version of Microsoft Office and are having great success. They are enjoying the ability to copy and paste text, and recognizing how it saves time. They have created a pictograph, and through this activity they have also learned how to crop images and utilize a table.

The upper grades have been exploring their Social Studies themes in MLT. Third grade is creating a PowerPoint presentation about water, the water cycle, why it is important, and what we can do to conserve water. After exploring Connecticut, fourth graders are now researching other New England states. Fifth graders are about to research explorers who came from Europe to what is now North America.

When your child has brought home a project from MLT, please take time to look at the attached rubric. The rubric grades the project and provides an easy way for students and their parents to view the individual student's achievement on each project. It will also give you insight into your child's report card grade in this subject.

In MLT, we have been exploring Cyberbullying with the fifth graders, and will be expanding this to grades 2 – 4 as the pacing with other lessons allows. The anonymity allowed by current technology creates enormous potential for cyberbullying. This can happen through the computer, cell phone and online games. You need to set guidelines with your children about what they can share, and when they need to come to you for permission before going onto a site. If your child is starting to utilize social networking sites like Facebook, you need to discuss how to make appropriate choices for friends, just as they do in face-to-face contact. They need to know what to do if there is inappropriate information being circulated, or if your child is becoming a target of bullying. It is important for children to understand that there are more safeguards for them around bullying, and there are more repercussions if they choose to engage in bullying behavior themselves. If you develop this routine early, it will just become part of the culture of your home. There are several other sites which look at these issues. You can preview them and see if they have information that you want to share with your child also. We actively do this in school, but, as in all things, you are your child's best teacher. Clearly, computers are a significant part of the life that our children are entering, and

as with all life skills, we need to guide them in developing the tools with which to deal with them.



We are continuing to stay focused on being showing Respect for Self, Respect for Others, and Respect for School. Don't forget to review with your child how to show positive behaviors at school.

All students in grades 1-5 are working to improve the recall speed of their basic facts including, addition (gr 1-5), subtraction (gr 1-5), multiplication (gr 3-5), and division (gr 4-5). Students in grades 3-5 are all working towards becoming a part of our competition of facts called, "Are You Faster Than a Fifth Grader?" In late January students will compete to see who knows their facts the fastest. Also, posters entitled "Thinking Math..." cover the walls of Roger Sherman reminding students to think about math beyond their classrooms.
